



## INTERPOL

In 2006, INTERPOL launched Project RADA, which means Piracy in Korean, on maritime security, specifically maritime piracy, armed robbery against ships. The objectives of this global project are to identify whereabouts of pirates, existing interactivities, areas of operation, modus operandi and links to other criminal activities. Once specific individuals have been identified, INTERPOL, together with the concerned member countries, will issue Red Notices (applicable for wanted persons based on a national arrest warrant) or Blue Notices (for suspect as well as those supporting individuals) to alert law enforcement in all of INTERPOL's 186 member countries. In addition, project RADA coordinates trans-national investigations involving law enforcement agencies against ships and aims at analyzing information about the potential threat to navigation. Furthermore, the project will provide training courses on maritime crimes for officers working within INTERPOL national focal points, added National Standard Bureaus, and will produce an annual report.

In the context of this project, INTERPOL also works in close cooperation with other international organizations, such as the International Maritime Organization (IMO), International Maritime Bureau (IMB), and Maritime Organization for West and Central Africa (MOWCA).

On 12 & 13 July 2007, INTERPOL jointly organized a Working Meeting on Maritime Piracy in Asia-Pacific Region in cooperation with the Korea Coast Guard in Busan, Korea. The event was attended by 39 participants from 14 countries and 2 international organizations (International Maritime Organization (IMO), and Information Sharing Center of Regional Cooperation Agreement on Combating Piracy and Armed Robbery against Ships in Asia (ISCPAC)). During the meeting, participants gave their perspectives on different areas of maritime crimes including maritime piracy, human smuggling, and drugs trafficking by ships as well as examining international

cooperation in the region. INTERPOL introduced its operational plan for its common operational analysis project RADA, and its intention to launch a global database on stolen vessels in the near future to assist marine communities in their investigations and identifying stolen vessels. Member countries were encouraged to more actively participate in project RADA, and share information including operational information in a timely manner in order to make this database of optimal use for the countries.
