Mr. Chair,

Seven years ago, we the Member States of the United Nations made a solemn pledge

This pledge is premised on the recognition that people are

the most important and valuable resource of any nation and should be given the

opportunity to make the most of their potential. Consequently, we must ensure that

our people are at the centre of our sustainable development strategies to facilitate

inclusive economic growth at all levels.

As we reflect on the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International

Conference on Population and Development, I take this opportunity to affirm

challenges such as poverty, increased urbanization, gender inequity and inequality,

illiteracy, unsustainable patterns of production and consumption, among others,

intersect and compound global efforts to achieve sustainable development. In this

context therefore, we must continue to strengthen capacity at the national, regional

and international levels to advance the objectives of the Programme of Action. More importantly, cooperation, as it relates to financing, remains critical in this respect.

The Government of Guyana is deliberate about executing people-centred development policies. Guided by the contract made with the people of Guyana, we are prioritizing inclusive economic growth focused on adequate employment, significant entrepreneurial activities, and a sustainable and diverse economy underpinned by seleurial activities

pillars of sustainable development social well-being, sustained economic growth and environmental preservation. In this context, please allow me to highlight a few of the important initiatives that my government has been undertaking to harness the interrelationships between population and sustained economic growth in the context of sustainable development.

First, recognising that food systems are critical not only to the elimination of hunger and the reduction of poverty but is also linked to the achievement of several of the Sustainable Development Goals. Guyana is pursuing ambitious plans to reduce food insecurity, capitalizing on its abundant natural resources and the potential to increase local agricultural output. Further, President Mohamed Irfaan Ali, has extended thip

existing housing schemes with the goal to deliver more than 50,000 house lots by 2025. Efforts are also being made to decentralise critical housing and water services across the country, by establishing additional offices across the various administrative regions, *inter alia*.

Third, conscious that

acknowledging the negative impact that the pandemic has had on learning, the Government of Guyana is providing tangible support for learning, from nursery to tertiary levels. This support includes the provision of twenty thousand (20,000) online scholarships concentrated in excess of one hundred and eighty-seven (187) areas of study from more than fifteen (15) reputable academic institutions across the world.
