Explanation of Position by Miriam Hughes, Duty U.S. Representative to ECOSOC, at the 39 Session of the Commission on Partion and Development, May 10, 2006

The United States is pleased to joinsensus on the two resolutions of the Session of the Commission on Population and Development with the following Explanation of Position.

Mr. Chairman, immigration has played very important and defining to shaping the history and success of the United States. The United States ves that order in gration, when managed effectively, is a positive phenomenon for both countries rigin and destination, as well as for the migrants themselves. Migration is a complex is sund the international community has found past attempts to deal with this subject at the inational level to be extremely difficult.

This trend was further evidenced by this years deliberations on migration. The United States was disappointed by the extended negotiations that required to come to consensus on the migration resolution. My delegation believes that value of resolutions produced by an ECOSOC functional commission such as the CPD is diministrated in meetings run over their allotted time.

Moreover, the extended and lengthy nature of theudisions that were required over the past month to produce a migration text highlight the very greialiculty the international community faces in addressing the complex topic rof gration at the global level.

The International Conference on Population Decdelopment Programme of Action expresses important political goals that the United States exels: We reaffirm the goals and objectives of the ICPD Programme of Action and Actions for Further Implementation of ICPD based on the following understandings.

We understand these documents constitute **portrant** policy framework that does not create international legal rights or legally binding obligons on states under international law.

Our reaffirmation of the goals and objectives of these documents not constitute a change in the position of the United States with respectreaties we have not ratified.

The United States fully supports the principle of undary choice regarding meanal and child health and family planning. We was stated clearly and on many occasi consistent with the ICPD, that we do not recognize abortion as a method of faprillynning, nor do we support abortion in our reproductive health assistance.

The United States interprets references within document to the Plan of Action of the World Conference against Racism, Rad Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance (Durban, 2001) as only applying to the migration-related provisions. The
