Your Excellencies,

Distinguished delegates,

Ladies and Gentlemen.

From the outset, let me affirm that the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD), remains relevant today, as it was in 1994 in Cairo.

Since the ICPD, Zimbabwe has made significant progress towards addressing population issues within the context of its development framework. We have also kept population issues from the overall development agenda.

Mr. President,

We note the great impact urbanisation has on population dynamics as well as development. In particular, rural areas face serious challenges, are some of the major population and development challenges. In many rural areas, countries, including Zimbabwe, we recorded rates of population growth that are among the highest in the world. This has led to a situation where rural areas remain lagging behind. Aderior, and accidents of these areas often grapple with inadequate water, sanitation and energy infrastructure.

Mr. President,

Zimbabwe's efforts on population and development are in line with the human rights underpinnings of the Programme of Action. This has led to improvements in the areas of gender equality and the empowerment of women, access to family planning, as well as expanded access to education for all. In the course of combatting the HIV/AIDS pandemic, we have also derived crucial lessons which helped us to strengthen our health systems.

Many developing countries, including my own, continue to grapple with high maternal mortality rates as well as high and non-optimal abortion rates. It is therefore imperative that we ensure that our health systems do not become death traps for women.

Mr. President;

Going forward, I urge all of us here gathered to do more in addressing other critical matters as identified in the Programme of Action such as the needs of elderly people, among them.

In fulfilling our obligations contained in the Programme of Action, let us discuss measures to combat other critical matters, most especially those related to the protection of the environment, and to increase resources in providing interventions for sustainable development.

In conclusion, let me exhort all of us to continue our collective efforts towards implementing the Programme of Action of the ICPD.
