

In this context, I am pleased to inform the General Assembly that the executive summary of the review is being prepared in an EasyRead format and will be available on the website in the early part of next year.

Recommendations

Empowered delegates, to address the aforementioned challenges, the report outlines a series of concrete measures to enhance accessibility: related international cooperation, encourage the participation of persons with disabilities in conferences and meetings, promote inclusive information and communications technologies, share good practices and knowledge, further assist and mainstream the disability inclusion agenda across the United Nations system.

Specifically, the report recommends that so far, the legislative bodies, should include in their respective agendas the review of periodic reports on the state of accessibility for persons with disabilities to conferences and meetings of the organizations of the United Nations system.

Furthermore, nine recommendations are addressed to the executive heads of organizations that include:

One; develop a comprehensive toolkit and guidelines on accessibility.

Two; ensure that accessibility requirements are clearly stated in individual agreements concluded with the hosting entity for specific conferences and meetings.

Three; appoint a focal point on accessibility under terms of reference that clearly define the focal point's role and responsibilities.

Four; develop a standard operating procedure/resolution on operational responsibilities of relevant (i) - 0 . 0 56571() - 1131(/) 1 .

While some agreed to include recommendations on accessibility in their global staff surveys, without waiting for the formal publication of the survey results, this proactivity indicates that the primary challenge in addressing accessibility is one of information deficits rather than an unwillingness to act.
