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Sixth Committee of the General Assembly

#### Item 78: Criminal Accountability of United Nations Officials

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New York

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Mr. Chairman,

At the outset, my delegation would like to pay tribute to the Secretary-General's report, A/68/215, on "Criminal accountability of United Nations officials".

Criminal Accountability is the cornerstone of the UN system. The UN must and all Member States should make it a reality.

The Republic of Korea is convinced that bringing UN personnel who committed a crime into justice is a crucial part of our ongoing fight against impunity. It is important to note that experts can improperly abuse immunity. For this sole purpose, the misuse of their immunities could bring about an accountability that is not legitimate, and impartiality of the process.

In this regard, my delegation wishes to note with appreciation that the Office of Legal Affairs referred the cases of 9 United Nations Officials to 9 States of nationality for investigation and prosecution this year. My delegation would like to emphasize that the States of nationality should take the necessary steps forward, including thorough investigation in cooperation with the UN.

[REDACTED] It is also of the view of this delegation that it is important that the Secretary-General make his annual report to the General Assembly on the activities of the Office of the Legal Affairs of ongoing investigations. This delegation also believes that the Office of the Legal Affairs of the UN should be given the authority to conduct its own investigation procedure, as well as the final results of cases within their jurisdiction. In this connection, the delegation notes that the three States to which referrals were made had instructed the OLA to ensure that the matter had been raised with relevant authorities in those countries. The delegation further notes that the UN has made efforts to prevent illegal retaliations and restore the reputation of those who were under false accusations.

Mr. Chairman,

The Republic of Korea believes that action must be taken now to prevent possible crimes against civilians in the prevention of possible crimes committed by UN personnel. My delegation would like to thank the Secretary-General for his continuing efforts and the practical steps he has taken in the concluding portion of his report. This delegation would like to emphasize the importance of strict adherence to standards of conduct, disciplinary measures and in-service induction training.

My delegation believes that the responsibility of the Secretary-General may also include the responsibility of Member States to make a concerted effort to prevent crime from occurring in the first place. We would like to emphasize the value of disciplinary training, importance of training prior to deployment, and strictness performed by each Member state.

For example, the Republic of Korea provides a three-month intensive training course to the selected personnel for Peacekeeping Operations. They have been chosen through a rigorous selection process among many able soldiers, and are in fact financed by the United Nations. The United Nations' strict and fortified training program provides

My delegation believes that both the United Nations and other Member States must do their best to work alongside each other to end impunity and to prevent crimes committed by UN personnel. Experts, including the Government's own internal investigation unit, can do their part.
