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Resumed Session of the Sixth Committee of the United Nations General Assembly

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The Sierra Leone delegation is delighted to emphasize key aspects regarding the fifth cluster, specifically on 'safeguards' encompassing Articles 5, 11, and 12 of the _____, / & & &rticles addressing the prevention and punishment of crimes against humanity.

In this debate, we wish to highlight three points:

First, on Article 5, , our delegation reiterates the significance of this article and appreciate s its prohibit ive nature, regarding a State s responsibility to prevent the occurrence of crimes against humanity. We subscribe to the proposals of adding additional guarantees for persons concerned with more safeguards based on well -established international and regional legal mechanisms . We do however agree that further deliberation on the inclusion of this draft article is necessary.

Second, and on Article 11,

, Sierra Leone welcomes the inclusion of provisions ensuring fair treatment of persons. In international criminal law, the rights of suspects and defendants are frequently overlooked, and we appreciate the emphasis placed on this aspect.

Third, and regarding

Sierra Leone emphasizes the paramount importance of victims' rights under international law. We acknowledge the Commission's inclusive provision covering participation and

racial equity , we still hold firm on our reservations on the scope of implementing these provisions.

This is particularly true for small and conflict -fragile states that may not have the available resources to respond to reparatory obligations, and even when such resources are available, they are insufficient ofcauesewiep8h hile statoa0 0d0992 re W* n BT /F6 1 -(1n-d8)

thereby reducing the burden on States but at the same time, ensuring victims receive the reparative justice due them.

Let me proceed to clarify that this is not a move to absolve

State s who are perpetrators from their obligation of reparative

justice, but rather to find a reasonable balance in this

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provide an avenue for the monetary aspect of reparations to

be addressed.

In closing, I would like to express my delegation's deep gratitude to the Chair of the Sixth Committee and the Bureau members, and co-facilitators, for their commendable guidance during this rich and insightful exchange of views.
