Implementation of the Vienna Programme of Action for Landlocked Developing Countries for the Decade 2014 -2024

Report of the Secretary-General

I. Introduction

In its resolution 74/233, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to submit to its 75th session a progress report on the implementation of the Vienna Programme of Action (VPoA) for Landlocked Developing Countries for the Decade 2014–2024.

This report provides comprehensive information and analysis on recent progress in the implementation of the Vienna Programme of Action covering all six priority areas for action and the performance of the LLDCs on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and recent socio-economic development.

II. Covid-19 pandemic has caused a marked increase in the demand for and use of internet access, as populations gloally turned to the internet for their day to day social and economic activities.

The ID UN-RLLS joint report on "<u>Economic impact of boadband</u> in the least developed countries (<u>LDCs</u>) landlocked developing countries (<u>LDCs</u>) and small island developing states (<u>SIDS</u>)" which confirmed the positive economic impact in the most vulnerable countries remains relevant.

LDCs, LLDCs and SIDS constitute **9** of the worlds most vulnerable nations **2** of them bing LLDCs) The report notes that some of these countries lag significantly behind in terms of achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (DGs) As part of the ongoing global efforts to help countries implement the 20**G** Agenda for Sustainable Development, it is necessary to pay particular attention to these three groups of countries.
