We know that the transport sector has been hit hard by the COVID-19 pandemic, in both the LLDCs and transit countries.

We know too that pre-existing challenges have been exacerbated still further, such as:

High transport costs;

Cumbersome border procedures;

And inadequate transport infrastructure.

To meet these challenges, we must forge stronger cooperation between LLDCs and their neighbours.

Distinguished participants,

We must build transport systems that are resilient to the impacts of external shocks - whether it be climate change, natural disasters, public health emergencies, or global economic downturns.

training will cover the importance of - including how to establish legal and regulatory frameworks that promote efficient transit transport.

Above all, I hope that you will share innovative solutions that are already being successfully applied. Solutions that can be adapted, scaled, or localized to yield concrete results.

Regional initiatives such as the Asia Highway Network and Trans-Asia Railway Network have improved connectivity and closed missing links.

The trilateral cooperation for the development of the China-Russia-Mongolia economic corridor is an example of neighbouring countries working together.

This will increase trade, strengthen transit cooperation, and build infrastructure. It is particularly important for Mongolia, a landlocked nation, between two giants.
