

Counter-Terrorism Committee Executive Directorate (CTED)

Acting on behalf of the Counter-Terrorism Committee, CTED conducted an assessment visit to Iraq in September 1997.

The visit report was endorsed by the Iraqi Government in March 1997 and subsequently adopted by the Committee.

At that time, Iraq's response to the terrorist threat was primarily military in nature.

In an effort to assist Iraq to combat terrorism also in non-military areas, particularly in the post-conflict phase, CTED identifies key recommendations Iraq may use to strengthen its overall response.

Recognizing that Iraq has the capacity to implement several of those recommendations, the Committee notes, nonetheless,
