"pandemic has e8posed underlying gender ine%ualities in various critical areas including health and economic empowerment* The study shows that women+s gains in entering the workforce have stalled and that they continue to spend more time on domestic work than men* Oender ine%ualities in all spheres of life are compounded &y other ine%ualities &ased on factors including age# ethnicity and wealth* While the pandemic continues to threaten the glo&al community# women make up more than 9, per cent of health care workers* Availa&le data from -: countries and territories reveal that women a&ove age 2, appear to &e more likely to &e diagnosed with '()D\$!
