I would also like to express my deep appreciation for the leadership provide is to th Committee by Ambassador Antonio Pedro Monteiro Lima over the past two **yeast**syear, Ambassador Lima stated that the overarching objective of this Committee is "to collectively provide...the best possible policy guidance to the Depart mode Rublic Information (DPI)so that our Organization continues to benefit from the strong voice given to it by DPI." Indeed, the strength of our voice depends in no small measure on the strength of this Committee's support guidance and encouragement which we are grateful.

The General Assembly, in its resolutions 65/10B, Arequested the Secreta Dependent to report to the 3rd session of the Committee on Information on the activities of the Department and on the implementation of its recommendations on questicating to public information. Through consultations with the Bureau of the Committee, it was decided that the information requested in the above resolution would be grouped into the three reports listed in your agenda.

These reports, organized acctions to our subprogrammes, provide an overview of the work and results of the Department.

I would like to take this opportunity toopdate the substantial information contained in the reports. While focusing on new initiatives, I will also address outrated future challenges. At the interactive dialogue with Member States later today, in this conference at coord p.m., you will have a further opportunity to discuss and review various aspects of our work. I encourage all of you, especially those adding the Committee for the first time, to join me and my colleagues in this lialogue I look forward to using his opportunity to introduce you to the new senior management team in the Departmeend to inviting our three new Directors speak, and listen, to you.

This year, my appeal is more cute than every even the pressures on the UN budget and the increasing demands on the Department would ask you to consider offsetting estre pressures by offering other forms of support cuch as providing DPI field offices with access to facilities to translate and print United Nations publications in national and regional languages at no cost facilitating tax/VAT exemptions for UNICs and, where needed, strengthening security for UN premises. For our part, we are examining ways to reduce set extremestiby changing the ways UNICs operate and by reducing the size of our premises in some case will continue to look for creative ways to ensure the effectiveness of our field offices.

In the light of thecurrent situation and with your general **de**rstanding, DPI will begin the process of reviewing the number and locations of UNICs from a strategic point of view, and will discuss this matter further with concerned Member States, the thaim of rationalizing and strengthening communications supplicer Member States and regions.

I know how important it is for Member States to maintain UN information centres; I have heard your strong statements. I have told you that while my predecessor made enormous changes with regard to UNICs, including for theiregionalization and phasing out, I did not make further changes. I kept the UNICs as they are. But, over the years, I have asked you to pro**fride** rent premises and support to UNICs. Some Member States have, but others have not. I know that the budgetsituation around the United Nations is dire. In the months ahead, you will be addressing the UN budget, and you will see that the DPI budget will be cut, in line with that of other

The Government of Rwanda continues to provide support to our outreach efforts on the Rwanda genocide and the lessons drawn from that tragedy. The support and ticonopera extended by the African Union for our commemormatiactivities and outreach programmearealso greatly appreciated.

The Department has loo made further progress in leveraging existing technology to expand the availability of United Nation pablications. United Nation books were included in an increasing number of mobile distribution services luding for the Kindle, the Apple iPad and the Sony ebook ReaderAnd for the first timethis year the United Nations Yearbook is also available in a version for mobile dises.

I believe that our expanding partnerships and collaboration with Member States, civil society, and UN partners, as well as our effective use of traditional and new dreerdian strates our determination to use our available resources in the most expire manner possibleWe will do our best to comply and meet your and the public growing expectations of the United Nations. And as I stated at the outset, we look to you, our Member States, to provide us with the means and mandate to achieve oullective goals.
