


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

The delegations unanimously reaffirmed their commitment to the international agreements adopted at the International Conference on Population and Development (Cairo) and the Fourth World Conference on Women (Beijing), which served as central elements of their activities relating to gender equity and the rights of women. A more in-depth analysis was needed in order to understand why economic development did not result in a positive change in the social situation of the countries in the region and how that fact tied in with the conclusions of recent studies on the feminization of poverty and its differential impact on women and men. They requested further development of the gender-sensitive studies on recent trade agreements and, in general, on the repercussions of international trade liberalization on women, in particular on the impact of globalization on their working conditions. All of the participants emphasized the huge significance of the period that had transpired since the World Conference in 1975, as the processes initiated on that occasion had radically altered the dynamic of relations between women and men, not only in the sphere of public or business roles but in all aspects of everyday life. They recognized the valuable work of institutions and organizations of the women's movement in those processes and illustrated them with facts and personal ancedotes.

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
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
