## Strategies for increasing men's involvement in the care economy

Distinguished colleagues	, it is a	tremendous	honour to	have this	opportunity	to explore
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Firstly, we need to pay careful attention to our institutions. We need to ensure that national governments assume their responsibilities related to the care economy—especially the provision of essential health care services. In Sub Saharan Africa, only a small minority of people have access to critical care for diarrhoea, far and away the single greatest cause of infant mortality—let alone HIV, TB and malaria. Who takes care of the many people suffering from conditions that can be prevented or treated? Women and girls, of course. But who makes macro economic decisions that determine the allocation
