



Mr. Chairman,

It my pleasure to address this assembly and share my country's perspective on the priority theme: The equal sharing of responsibilities between women and men, including caregiving in the context of HIV/AIDS. At the outset, my delegation wishes to align itself with the statement made earlier by Sudan on behalf of the Group of 77 and China.
