Mr. Chairman,

It is my honour to speak on behalf of the members of ASEAN. We would like to associate ourselves with the statement made by the representative of Australia on behalf of the G77 and China.

Let me also join other delegations who have spoken before me in congratulating you, your election as Chairman of the Commission, and members of the Bureau for their respective elections.

ASEAN affirms the importance of gender equality, the promotion and protection of the full enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms for all are essential to advance development, peace, security, in this connection, be assured that ASEAN will work with you and the members of the Bureau to ensure the successful outcome of this meeting.

Mr. Chairman

The Beijing Declaration, adopted at the Fourth World Conference, is an important contribution to the advancement of women worldwide, and the achievement of gender equality. It is imperative that the member states, the UN system and other relevant organizations, translate it from words into actions.

At the 54th Session last year, we adopted the Beijing Platform for Action towards achieving gender equality and the empowerment of women.

However, I must stress that challenges still exist in the implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, and the outcome documents of the twenty-third session of the General Assembly. We therefore pledged, in 1995, to take further action towards their full and effective implementation.

ASEAN is determined to take all necessary measures to enhance the conditions that have been impeding progress towards the advancement of women worldwide, and gender equality. We are committed to eliminating all forms of discrimination against women, empowering women, and strengthening their economic independence. We support the protection, promotion and the enjoyment of all human rights, fundamental freedoms, in order to allow all men and girls to protect themselves against violence.

At the First Meeting of ASEAN Commission on the Promotion and Protection of the Rights of Women and Children (ACWC), held in Jakarta last week, ASEAN seeks to promote the well-being, development, empowerment and participation of women and children in the ASEAN Community building process. These efforts would help promote public awareness and education of their rights. The meeting, including identified thematic issues for the future work plan of ACWC, some of which could relate to the global priorities and issues being addressed by SWD and WHRD...

Mr. Chairman,

Being cognizant of the multiple roles of women in the family, in production and building up of their deserve to be diverse, multi-dimensional approaches and opportunities to enable them to undertake their tasks effectively.

In this context, education is a vital building block to help women fulfill their role more effectively. It is also a vital tool in removing economic, socio-cultural and political barriers. It further provides the means for achieving a balanced and equal relationship between women and men. Therefore, ensuring and guaranteeing access to education to all girls in particular, we must all strive.

Furthermore, in the context of today's world economy, this is increasingly important. Knowledge, science and education is vital. It is important therefore to promote the active participation and integration of women, as well as developing their technical competencies to widen the pool of human resources available to perform these tasks. For this reason, we need to develop human resources through life long learning, and promoting science and technology.

Mr. Chairman,

In ASEAN, despite experiencing rapid economic growth, many countries are still facing inequalities and disproportionate representation of women among the poor, and ethnic minorities have been exacerbated during the recent financial crisis.

To address this challenge effectively, among others, we are promoting and investing in education and life long learning, human resource training, and capacity building.

To encourage innovation and entrepreneurship, current efforts are directed towards the attainment of a technological environment, with an adequate pool of technological qualified and trained manpower, and strong networks of scientific and technological institutions and centers of excellence.

In view of the priority and review themes of this 35th Session, ASEAN commences the following concerted actions:

- To strengthen the provisions to ensure equal access to essential affordable and accessible public and social services, including education and training at all levels, as well as all types of permanent and sustainable social protection/child security systems for women throughout their cycle.
- To achieve universal access to primary education across ASEAN by 2015, with priorities to prioritize and ensure quality, comprehensive primary education for all and gender equality in education through educational infrastructure non-discriminatory education regardless of social class, geography, ethnicity, background or physical disabilities, with 70 percent target benchmark achieved by the end of 2011.

- To develop gender-responsive skills training programmes for trainees in ASEAN Member States
- To develop a workforce and manpower with higher levels of capacity, knowledge and expertise.
- To promote active mainstreaming of a gender perspective in policy making, implementation and evaluation of regional, national and local policies and programmes, including the development of gender analysis tools for the effective monitoring and assessment for gender gains and gaps.

Mr. Chairman,

Finally, once again, we would like to call on the UN system, international organizations and all sectors of civil society, including non-governmental organizations as well as women and men, to fully commit themselves and intensify their efforts to the implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, and the outcomes of the World Conference on Women, in the context of the Sustainable Development Goals.
