Ladies and Gentlemen

On behalf of H.E. the Chairperson of the 55th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women, I have the honour to make a statement at the 55th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women, whose theme is "Access and participation of women and girls to education, training, science and technology, including for the promotion of women's equal access to fair employment and decent work."

Let me also join other speakers by congratulating the Chairwoman and members of the Bureau of the Commission on the Status of Women who are conducting this meeting. The AU Commission also wishes to align itself to statements made on behalf of G77 and African Member States.

On the outset, let me renew congratulations of H.E. the Chairperson of the African Union Commission to Dr. Michelle Bachelet for her appointment as the new UN Women Executive Director and Under-Secretary-General of United Nations. H.E. the Chairperson had the opportunity to meet the Executive Director in Addis Ababa at the 2011 High-level Summit and was able to convey his best wishes and that of the entire Commission to Madam Bachelet.

Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

The synergy demonstrated by UN Women's thematic priorities chosen by UN Women provides a natural entry point for UN Women to engage the African Committee. When Madame Bachir attended the January 2011 Summit, she had the opportunity to discuss the nexus between the UN Women's priorities and the Decade's themes with the AU Commission and stakeholders attending the Summit including the Civil Society Community. The Commission pledged to work with UN Women and support UN Women's actions to advance gender equality and women's empowerment in an unprecedented manner, aimed at transforming African Women's daily reality in general and that of rural women in particular.

Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

Following Ms. Bachir's 100 days' vision and UN women's selected priorities, the Commission has carried out a quick analysis of the UN Women priorities and is pleased to note that 5 of its selected priorities constitute half (50%) of the 10 themes chosen for the African Women's Decade. These priorities are Expanding women's voice and participation in decision-making which is in line with theme 9 of the Decade; Ending violence against women, which is in line with theme 7 of the Decade; Strengthening implementation of gender responsive women's peace and security agenda which is in line with theme 6 of the Decade; Enhancing women's economic empowerment, which is in line with theme 9 of the Decade; and Making gender equality priorities central to National, local and sectoral budgeting, which is in line with theme 6 of the Decade. We see great synergy between the Decade's themes and believe that the accelerated advancement of women globally through the United Nations work will translate directly into improving all African women's lives in general and rural women in particular.

Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

The African Union has continued to provide leadership in championing Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment through its around breaking commitments which constitute the AU Gender Architecture and well illuminated. During its statements at the CSW. With the thirteenth framework in place, I am pleased to say the AU has moved one step forward. It has adopted "the African Women's Decade as the framework to guide implementation of Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment agenda through the 10 themes encapsulated in the initial Declaration following the successful Launch of the African Women's Decade on 15 October 2015, in Nairobi, Kenya in a colourful ceremony.

The Launch was attended by over 2,000 delegates from across the continent and the globe including African Heads of States and Government, First Ladies, Vice Presidents, Prime Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, United Nations Agencies, Parliamentarians, Government delegations, Gender experts, CSOs, Youth, Grassroots women and Male Champions for GEWEA. The UN Deputy Secretary General led the UN delegation to the function. Furthermore, the high-level panel of the launch included, among others, the Launching of the Decade, a direct reminder that the Assembly of AU Heads of State and Government, also provided a vehicle for mobilizing resources for the implementation of the Decade's activities.

Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

I am happy to inform you that the African Women's Decade Launch was marked with the launch of "Rural Women's Day" in line with the theme of the Decade which was "Grassroots Approach to Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment". The Launch was preceded by important forums including NGO Forum, Experts' and Ministers of Women Affairs and Gender meetings and Caucuses based on the 10 Themes of the Decade.

The aim of the African Women's Decade is to accelerate implementation of gender equality and women's empowerment (GEWE) through developing down-to-earth and bottom-up approaches which are inclusive of grassroots participation. The objective of the Decade is to re-invigorate commitments to accelerated implementation of agreed international standards for gender equality and women's empowerment (GEWE).

Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

I invite delegations to visit the African women's decade Website at www.africanwomendecade.org for important documents where much of the 10 Decade Themes are elaborated.

Theme No 3 of the AWD namely 'Health, Maternal Mortality and HIV/AIDS' was chosen by the AU Ministers of Gender and Women's Affairs as the theme for 2011. This was in view of the momentum generated by the 'All Heads of State and Government's' 2010/11 Kampala Summit theme. In this regard the Commission has been able to organize a parallel meeting in the mid year and also a similar Roundtable on the theme of the July 2011 Summit, namely "Accelerating Youth empowerment for sustainable development", a theme that is closely related to the theme of this Session of the 30th CSD. We thank our delegates for attending the mid year meeting. The attached Table 2 Box Young Table is to identify 53-106 grassroots initiatives (2 per country) that the Union was support in 2011.

Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

In the High Level Roundtables held last week the Commission was able to share its experience, discuss the best and worst practices in the 2011 theme. Highlighting the Millennium Development Initiative which has been instrumental in advancing intellectualism, encourage science and technology and innovation young generations of Africans, the Commission cited the African Union Scientific Awards which awards scientific prizes at three levels. These include the AU

\$ 5,000), Regional (US \$ 20,000) and Continental level (US \$ 100,000). As you can see, work is already happening on the continent of Africa with a theme of the African Union Commission on Economic/Education, Science and Technology. More focus will be directed to the continent of Africa for women and girls.

Once again, on behalf of the Chairperson of the African Union Commission, may I pledge our support to UN Women and assure Madam Executive Director of UN Women, Commissions strong and best wishes.
