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## Asia Pacific Caucus Statement

55<sup>th</sup> CSW Session, 2011

**Chairperson CSW, Excellencies distinguished delegates,女士们先生们, the women's movement and friends:**

We are privileged to make this statement in the name of Asia Pacific Caucus. We welcome first of all the creation of the UN Women and the appointment of the former Chilean President Michelle Bachelet as the first Head of the UN Women. She will be our voice at the UN Table.

We welcome the priority given by the UN Commission on the Status of Women on "Access and Participation of Women and Girls to Education, training, Science and Technology including funding for the Promotion of Women's Equal Access to Information, Employment and Development". We also welcome the re-institutionalisation of the Beijing Platform for Action and the Millennium Development Goals.

We note with concern that even after 15 years of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and its 10 year review, significant progress has been made with regard to commitments on education and scientific training, information and communication technology, in particular. While we acknowledge that in some of the countries more girls than boys are out-pacing boys in levels of higher education we still have a large part of the world where access to education and education levels were still far from equal. In addition, 60 percent of school drop outs were girls (where?) Preventing girls from finishing even basic education burdens their choices and determine their own future.

The Expert Group Report and other documents clearly reveal that there are major gaps that need to be addressed. Given the insurmountable challenges that women confront in

In the current economic crisis, education system will sustain severe damage and children marginalised by poverty, gender and ethnically stand to bear the brunt. It would further exacerbate the crisis of female unemployment and push many more women to vulnerable employment.

We urge all states to adopt and implement policies that prohibit employment discrimination, workplace harassment and all forms of exploitation of women and girls.

We call upon the states to recognise right to education as a fundamental human right and ensure that it facilitates the empowerment of women and gender equality. The quality of education is equally important and should free from gender bias and stereotypes. Negative stereotypes concerning the perceived suitability of women for science and technology careers must be tackled at all levels.

We urge all states to address the socio cultural factors including violence that disadvantage women and girls from entering and pursuing careers in science and/or technology. Mentoring to encourage women and girls to go into career in science and technology should be provided.

The Asia Pacific region which has the 60 percent of the female population of the world, is the region which is conflict ridden, which has high percentage of internally displaced persons and is a region that has suffered both natural and human made disasters. We call upon governments and international organisations to support women and girls affected as such are also provided opportunities and access to education and technology. Girls from rural areas, especially those in our tribal communities need special attention.

Gender and age disaggregated data is imperative for assessing and enhancing opportunities for education and science,

Last but not the least, we look forward with great hope and expectation to the UN Women is not only a strong entity to addressing the economic and social rights of women and advance women's human rights but also to work with civil society organisations to build meaningful civil society participation in UN Women at the UN as well as regional and country level.
