



ORAL STATEMENT TO BE DELIVERED TO THE GENERAL DISCUSSION

THE 55TH SESSION OF THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN

24 February 2011

Excelsior, Distinguished Delegates, NGO Representatives, Ladies and Gentlemen

Thank you for this opportunity to participate in the general discussion and address the 55th session of the Commission on the Status of Women.

Approximately 16,000 people who attended the NGO Committee on the Status of Women on 21 February 2011, a day which UN Women representatives represented women and girls worldwide.

Our participants reaffirmed the major UN Women map our recommendations to this document.

Our recommendations focused on five areas: education and training, employment and decent work, gender-responsive products, discrimination and violence against the girl child, and UN Women.

- 1) NGOs strongest recommendation is an emphasis on early learning and the role of parents. Parents' children's life, here the community must support parents, parents. The economic dimension of schooling must be considered, early education must be free and families should be subsidized for sending their daughters to school. Textbooks and curricula must use positive images of girls and women in science and math. Teachers should be trained to recognize stereotypes in teaching science and math for girls.
- 2) NGOs urge the review of products to ensure that they are appropriate for girls and women across a wide range of industries, from automobile seat belts designed for men, to pharmaceutical research performed exclusively on male animals. To bring women into business, new forms for training must be created. Examination of the 'leaky pipeline' and the 'glass ceiling' will lead to innovative methods of retaining women in decent work and in leadership roles.
- 3) NGOs expressed concern about ensuring access to technology for women who live in rural areas, and may be poor and marginalized.
- 4) NGOs urge the use of technology to heighten communication, engagement and awareness to end discrimination and violence against women and girls. This includes social media, video games and pornography.
- 5) NGOs are dedicated to liaise with UN Women. Our participants encourage a clear commitment to sustainable contributions by Member States to UN Women to achieve its mandate for change.
