**Statement by H.E. Ambassador Samia Barakat, Senior Advisor, before the
United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, Fifty-first Session, 28
February 2011; (Please Check Against Delivery)**

My delegation is honored to address your commission and would like to begin by congratulating you, My Chair, and the other members of the Bureau on your election; we pledge our full support and cooperation.

Before proceeding with our statement, my delegation wishes to express our appreciation to the Secretary-General (SG) for his report on the situation and assistance to Palestinian women and stress the importance of peace. Having said this, we regret having to repeat our deep concern in the situation in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, which is unequivocally a case of foreign occupation, the root cause of the situation. We submit that unquestionably important aspects of the situation on the ground and of the humanitarian and socio-economic conditions of the Palestinian population under occupation. This trend of distorting and/or omitting the facts during events in general, in particular in the United Nations, including those of the Secretary-General to the CSW such as the one before us, must be rectified in future reports.

Mr. Chairman,

The role of Palestinian women in their movement has been influenced, and to a certain extent, diminished in the last 41 years of military occupation. It is within this context that Palestinian women have borne the brunt of Israel's illegal policies and practices that have plagued their political and social development. Day in and day out, we are forced to witness the degradation of suffering and flagrant human rights violations committed by Israel, the occupying power, against the Palestinian civilian population, which has made so severe restrictions, not only on the development and empowerment of Palestinian women, but their well-being and even their survival. Their right to life, to return to their homes and property, to livelihood, to housing, to education, to health, to development and to freedom of movement, just to name a few, have all been consistently and systematically infringed by the occupying Power in gross violation of international law, agreements and international humanitarian law.

used over the years has increased significantly, and more attention is being paid to this area. The trend continues as more countries implement strict rules and regulations to combat climate change. In addition, there is a growing recognition of the importance of sustainable development, which emphasizes the need to balance economic growth with environmental protection. This shift in focus has led to significant improvements in energy efficiency, renewable energy sources, and waste management. As a result, the world is becoming more sustainable and less dependent on fossil fuels.

Mr. Chairman,

The situation in the besieged Gaza Strip remains relentless and tragic. For more than three years, Israel, the occupying Power, has collectively ~~systematically~~ punished ~~imprisoned~~ and deprived more than 1.5 million Palestinian people of their basic human rights. Mass unemployment, extreme poverty, lack of basic services, the steady increase in food prices caused by shortages have left roughly five thousand families in Gaza dependent on humanitarian aid. Two years of the already grave situation, more than two years have passed since the December 2008 Israeli military aggression against the Gaza Strip, and the Palestinian people are still being prevented from reconstructing and rehabilitating their communities and lives. The debilitating effects of that military aggression and the blockade continue to impair the socio-economic and humanitarian conditions and to cause serious psychological trauma among the Palestinian civilian population, in particular women and children. We reiterate our call for the illegal blockade to be lifted and call for accountability for the crimes perpetrated by the Israeli occupying forces and for justice to be reached for the victims.

At the same time, in the occupied West Bank, the confiscation of Palestinian land, the construction of settlements at the expense of farmers and settlers, home demolitions and evictions, the construction of the wall, the punishment of hundreds of checkpoints and other colonization measures have not ceased for a single moment; and in fact have intensified, especially in Occupied East Jerusalem. The cumulative impact of this illegal Israeli policy on the contiguity, integrity, safety and viability of the West Bank territory has been disastrous. Moreover, it has an equally devastating impact on the drive for the peace that the entire Palestinian population can count on to end the serious threat to the prospect of achieving the two State solution on the basis of the pre-1967 borders.

Mr. Chairman,

The formidable and daunting challenges posed by the Israeli occupation and all of its illegal and brutal policies continue to make the achievement of gender equality towards the advancement of Palestinian women improbable, if not impossible to realize. However, with great resilience and determination, Palestinian women are making every effort to overcome these challenges.

At the national level, Palestinian women continue to strive to reach the goal of national liberation and social emancipation by integrating human rights, equality and empowerment in national policies, development framework and laws. At the local level, the necessity of improving the technical and organizational capacity of the Ministry of Women's Affairs and civil society organizations, in order to institutionalize gender equality and empowerment. This is a clear priority as is the community-based organization of women through the "Empowerment of Community-Based Organizations and others", which aims at eliminating gender-based violence in the Palestinian society within the framework of Security Council resolution 1325. Furthermore, the issue of full equality between women and men has been set as a top priority in the state-building plan launched by Prime Minister Salam Fayyad in August 2009 entitled, "Ending the Occupation,

“Women and the State,” BM Enquiry has called and stressed for the equal involvement and participation of women in achieving this internationally backed initiative.

Mr. Chairman, you have had numerous opportunities to review some of the recommendations made by the committee and we would appreciate your comments.

It must be overemphasized that the importance of increased assistance and support to Palestinian women by the international community and the United Nations, including the Commission on Status of Women and UN Women, especially at this critical time. We call for a global and women worldwide to march hand in hand with the Palestinian people to demand an end to Israel's occupation in order to allow for the true advancement and empowerment of all Palestinian women to occur in their independent, free and democratic State of Palestine with East Jerusalem as its capital.
