today. Our organisations, representing millions of young women and girls from all

corners of the globe, would like to highlight the unique barriers that violence against

girls and young women present when accessing education, training and later the

labour market. We would also like to suggest that ensuring girls' and young women's

have equal access to education can prevent violence from occurring across a woman's

lifespan.

We are greatly concerned about the increasing number of girls who are exposed to violence and exposed to violence in every sphere of their lives, from the family home to school and the community.

Violence does not affect girls alone, but it is the girl children who bear the brunt of violence, and suffers the most.

Violence against girls and young women can break education, health care, and other opportunities.

Violence against boys and girls can prevent violence.

ensure that girls are not at risk of violence, assault or abuse on their way to and from

school, and that school environments are not one where violence can easily occur,

for example by designing in such a way that facilities such as toilets and drinking

water are easily and safely accessible.

On the international front, UNFPA should help to establish UNIS for women and girls and

recognize the great potential of education to eliminate violence by ensuring that girls

have accessible, acceptable, available, and dignified sanitation, formal as well as

non-formal, Awareness raising programmes that inform girls of their rights and how

they can protect themselves, as well as programmes that

educate men, boys, parents, teachers, community, political and religious leaders

about the rights of girls and the unacceptability of any form of violence. Governments

should also provide incentives for teachers and students to work with non formal

education to implement these activities.'
