Good morning Mr Chairman, distinguished members, NGOs and representatives from the
president of RESO-Femmes. RESO-Femmes is an international network based in Geneva and RESO-
Femmes network consists of different organisations, is based in West Africa. We began
with a pilot project in 2003 in Mali to try to systematize the observation of the
of empowerment in the region from rural and urban women and how to improve their
conditions and statutory situations. We were very surprised to see that ideas and local women
innovations already existed in Mali but was hardly acknowledged by the international
community and in the international institutions.

Therefore we initiated a research action program to work on improving the visibility of
isolated rural and regional groups of women and strengthen their own civil and
democratic environment. We based our approach on integrating different groups of women
from local organization. For that we tried to recruit women from various fields of

leaders recruited from different associations which already covered the different fields of
MDG goals. Actually 8 specific approaches are integrated to our programme namely Gender, rural
empowerment, parity to allow more equitable access of women to resources and greater
equity in assisting the forgotten people in the world. Without entering into details, we would
like to name a few good indicators selected directly from the women's side of view including
the different themes of this conference. First, I think that we need to integrate other local
value systems to evaluate women participation and to reinforce the movement for women
empowerment from the local history movement. We know for instance from our
experience of Mali, that international institutions have poor knowledge of local political
participation and that it is very important to train women together and to develop innovative
tools and methods if we want to promote women's equal access in political, social and

economic decisions. It illustrates how these economic initiatives fit into our importance in our network and would like to emphasize the necessity of feminist actions both in our women's structures and their movements.

- 1- To encourage political action and eliminate all forms of discrimination based on gender against all women : we have developed some projects to encourage political participation from the local and national level and give them enough resources to understand their fixed objectives. Our gender team is focused on research based on these results and their diffusion.
- 2- To foster social action : we train together and with the same program all kind of women and give them enough power and self-esteem to believe that they can become true harbingers of change ambassadors of their community and also for their whole nation. From our results we are now trying to systematize our training programs in Burkina Faso, Mali, Niger, Nigeria, Côte d'Ivoire, Bénin, Togo. Our website has more information on these programs.
- 3- To spur economic action : we have recently created a new project "EAA" customized to local needs and the voice of women. This project is a capacity building program which is very helpful to train women in business, financial, technical and political communication. Our research department has been structured so that our partners who are involved in the rural organization to global issues. This project has come at a crucial time especially in West Africa where gender experiences over 6 years (when our NGO was created) in the project "Water, Sanitation, Food" presents the advantages of women to force other partners to take them seriously through our efforts to work with manipulation instead of going around them in their work still even now a lot of resistance justified by the alleged lack of experience in this field and lack of competence grounded on entrenched stereotypes. I thus would like to make the voice of my West African partners here and hope that you may help speed up our actions through financial and logistical support. We are very happy to see that ON Women is here and we hope to submit strong support for our members well. We thank you very much for this forum opportunity to speak on behalf of our members.
