**Ladies and Gentlemen**

On behalf of H.E. the Chairperson of the African Union Commission, Dr Jean Ping, I have the honour to make a statement at the 56<sup>th</sup> Session of Commission on the Status of Women on the theme: **Empowering Women and Girls in Diversity and Ridding Hunger, Exploitation, Development and Current Challenges**

Let me also join earlier speakers by congratulating the Chairperson and members of the Bureau for their elections and the efficient way in which they are conducting this meeting. The AU Commission place wishes to align itself to statements made by Algeria before C77/1577 thru Statement made by Tunisia on behalf of the Africa Group.

On the outset, rural women constitute more than half of Africa's 80% rural population. Some 60% of the rural population of the continent with little or no access to basic and essential services. The AU also recognize those urban poor women who also constitute majority of citizens living in urban slums, sometimes in same conditions as the rural women. The reason why rural women continue to experience poverty, hunger and under development are all known and well researched and yet little progress has been made.

## Ladies and Gentlemen...

Most statements from African member states have underlined measures that have been taken at the national level to fight these challenges. The African Union statement will try to demonstrate some (not all) measures that have been taken at the regional level by the Union to recognize the crucial role of rural women who continue to produce and feed the entire continent, despite their under privileged conditions.

1. The African Union chose the International Bureau of Women's Day (10 October 2010) to launch African Women's Decade 2010-2020 in Nairobi, Kenya. This movement is instrumental in giving prominence to African Rural Women, who constituted 75% of the participants to the launch
2. The Theme chosen for the African Women's Decade is "African Approach to Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment" which again emphasizes that during the next 10 years, the African continent will be laying special attention to rural women's needs
3. The theme for the 56<sup>th</sup> CSW which is focuses on rural women's contribution to development, their Role in fighting poverty and hunger. Eradicating poverty is the African Women's Decade theme for 2012, which is "Agriculture and Food Security".
4. In recognizing and appreciating the link between the 56<sup>th</sup> Theme of the CSW and the theme for the African Women's Decade for 2012, the Commission of the African Union in collaboration with the International Labor Organization (ILO) Regional Office in Addis Ababa organized a Ministerial Dialogue on 3rd March 2010 between Ministers of Labor, Ministers of Gender, Women's Affairs and Rural women to

discourse on these two themes is one of the best opportunities to move forward in enriching the African Women's Decade implementation.

### Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

The synergy demonstrated by the African Women's Decade themes for 2012 and the theme chosen for 56<sup>th</sup> CSW, therefore provides yet another entry point for United Nations Agencies, UN Women and other African partners to support the implementation of the Decade for the benefit of African Women in general and rural women in particular.

### Chairperson, Ladies and Gentlemen

You will recall that at the 55<sup>th</sup> session of the CSW, the Commission shared its efforts to mainstream gender issues in the thematic focus of the Empowerment of African Women: "Simplifying the way of one theme per year". It was decided to report that the Commission received 105 rural projects under the 2011's Theme which was Women's Health, Water and Sanitation. In 2012, it is hoped that these projects were approved for funding. It is worth to reiterate that the criteria used was biased to support rural minorities and those districts that were not funded were not able to demonstrate that they were rural. In 2012, a similar Call will be made on the Themes of Agriculture and Food Security. The Commission wishes to encourage rural women to apply and its members states to facilitate this process.
