### Third Committee Advancement of women

Chair,

First of all let me congratulate the winners of this year's Nobel Peace Prize, Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, Leymah Gbowee and Tawakkul Karman.

The Norwegian Prime Minister, Mr. Stoltenberg, stated that "the three laureates have each made a distinctive contribution to the empowerment of women in their countries and helped to give... women a voice. This is a key condition for all other human rights and new fight for more equality and equal opportunities all over the world".

Needless to say, this year's award serves as a great inspiration for all of us!

Chair,

Lack of equality between women and men is one of the greatest challenges of our time. It is also the key to prosperity and development.

Today I would like to draw your attention to the World Bank Development Report. One of many reports emphasising the correlation between equality and development.

The main message in this report is that gender equality is an investment for development.

Not only is gender equality smart economics, but it also empowers women as economic, political, and social actors which leads to more representative decision making.

This leads to improved outcomes for the next generations.

Reports from several international organizations over the past years have given us evidence of the imbalance between men and women in economic and political decision making in all parts of the world.

They also show the importance of equality as a pre-requisite for development.

We know that the pace of future economic and social development for all depends on whether and to what extent women and girls are included in society in the same way as boys and men.

The World Bank report puts gender equality on the top of the global agenda. Norway applauds this.

Gender equality must be treated merely as a side-event to a side-agenda by some existing programs neither in a UN context, nor in the member-states.

Gender Equality must be made a central agenda of gender, physical abilities or sexual orientation, into all processes which concern our future development.

Chair,

UN Women will play an important role in our respect.

Norway is looking forward to UN Women and we have high expectations to what the organization can achieve in partnership with member states.

We want to play a constructive, and if necessary, critical role as a partner for the new organization. This week Marit Arnstad is visiting Norway and will meet with our prime minister and other cabinet ministers discussing equality issues. We look forward to discuss with her how in new areas of our work participation and freedom from violence can be implemented,

Chair,

Gender equality is also a cornerstone for environmental sustainable development.

Norway will like to see gender equality as an integrated and mainstreamed issue not only in COP 17 in Durban later this year, but also at Rio+20 next year.

Global warming, climate changes and natural disasters constitute a threat to food security, to sustainable development and leads to migration.

These changes affect women and children differently from men.

Over the years the links between gender and environment, and certain sustainable development issues are becoming more and more evident.

The report of the Secretary-General on *Improvement of the situation of women in rural areas* (A/66/150) points out that there is a growing recognition that rural women are key agents in poverty reduction, and in achieving rural sustainable development.

In many parts of the world women lack land, property, nor members of influential organizations and have no access to knowledge, technology and decision making in the agriculture sector.

Hardly any of the aid programmes are linked directly to gender.

Let me revert to the World Bank Report which shows that over the past ten years only 10.01 per cent out of the World Bank's total budget has been used on gender equality programmes.

However, the World Bank will from now on be mainstreaming gender equality into all their activities.

Chair,

Facts and figures does not fully give us a picture of the links between men and women in the world today. They also show that the key to the empowerment of half the world's population made up by women and girls, by ensuring them the same rights and opportunities as boys and men.

Gender equality can only be achieved when men and women work together towards the same goals.
